Local Charity Responds to the First Heat of the Season

Vancouver, B.C. (July 27) – In response to soaring temperatures across the province, The Salvation Army is helping those most vulnerable to these conditions, including elderly and those living on the streets, by providing hydration and assistance to people.

“The rising temperatures impact the health and safety of people living on the streets,” says Mike Leland. “When you don’t have access to water and shelter, you are exposed to things like heat stroke, dehydration both of which have potentially dangerous outcomes.”

The dedicated teams of staff and volunteers across the province are ensuring people are getting the help they need this week to make it through the heat.

“Across the province we are opening up shelter spaces, offering water, providing sun block and other essential to keep people safe from the heat,” he explains. “The safety of vulnerable people in our communities is our number one concern, during these extreme conditions.”
