Truth and Reconciliation Commission

The establishment of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada was a consequence of the Indian Residential Schools Settlement Agreement, the largest class-action settlement in Canadian history. Between 2008 and 2015, the Truth and Reconciliation Commission travelled across Canada, hosting seven national public events. The Commission put forth 94 Calls to Action to further reconciliation between Indigenous and non-Indigenous peoples in Canada, of which only one had a specific deadline. **Call to Action 48** was to be completed by March 31, 2016. It called churches, faith groups and interfaith groups to issue a statement indicating how they will implement the principles, norms and standards of the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples as a framework for reconciliation.



Journey of Reconciliation – The Salvation Army’s role
